Thank you for your email and for preparing this proposal. We have discussed it, but given our current heavy workload with regards to the finalization of the Seed Box program and the organization of the Community Garden Festival, we don't think it is feasible to stage this quite ambitious debate within the Seed Box program period. Hi Johan,

Thank you for your email. We are sorry to hear that you are leaving the mentorship program, and we regret that you decided not to avail yourself of a mentorship opportunity. We will get in touch with Sven Anders and of course clear everything with him. You should not cover any costs yourself.

Setting up a mentorship program like this involves multiple considerations about how to match mentors and mentees. Since this was a new mentorship program, which none of us in the management team had run previously, we did not have everything related to budget frames, format etc settled from the outset. For instance, while we initially contemplated the idea of having two mentors for each mentee, this proved impractical and as it now stands, all the postdocs involved in the program only have one mentor each. Also, no one simply got to choose their mentor, but this has been a more comprehensive matching process.

- In your case, the management team decided to go for Sven Anders for several reasons:

 He was on your list of suggested mentors.
 Although he has previously collaborated with some Seed Box researchers, he is a new partner in the second phase of the Seed Box. We saw his inclusion in the mentorship program as a good way of integrating him further in the SB network and enable the postdoc group to benefit from his experiences and competence.
 In addition to being an academic, he is also a literary critic and editor at Aftonbladet, and as such he represents someone who bridges the academic and non-academic worlds.
 A text Minimum Academic of the prior to your superciting him and an such he represents prior to your other here.

 - As for MK, none of us had heard of him prior to your suggesting him, and as such it was more difficult to assess whether he would be a suitable candidate for the mentoring program. But we explored this option as well, and as you know we asked you to 4. motivate this choice

further. After looking into his profile, we felt that for the formal role as a mentor in a program that draws strongly on e.g. decolonisation and intersectional perspectives, this did not seem like a clear-cut match. Our decision for the mentor is also based on what would be best for the postdoc group as a whole, who should also be able benefit from the conversation. For this reason, as its now stands, all of the mentors are academics or scholarly researchers. However, as we have stated earlier – not the least in Astrida's mail from this summer – of course we have no objections if you want to invite MK to give a seminar, comment on texts etc, within the framework of your Seed Box project. If so, this is something you should bring up with your project leader. We agree that his perspectives, as we understand them, could be important for your particular project to broaden the understanding of your empirical data. As Astrida said in your conversation last fall, we thought that you provided strong arguments for this in your response to us when we asked for motivations for the suggestion of MK and we welcome n with him

place to do this.

If you would like to organise a seminar around the general topics that you suggested in your email, you would be most welcome to do so within the framework of the Seed Box seminar series. Please feel free to invite us and/or others to engage in this discussion. For practical reasons, we would suggest to plan it for the latter part of this semester, preferably at a late afternoon time to enable Astrida to join.

We hope this clarified how we in the management team have worked with the mentoring program in general and your case in particular.

Hi Astrida and Victoria,

I've now had a chance to think through the mentorship properly with Veronica Gyberg and Björn-Ola Linnér (after recommendation from Eva who is still undergoing treatment). While they did not advice on any specific course of action, it was helpful for me to discuss the matter with them. I have now come to the decision that I will decline from participating in Seed Box's mentorship program. I have also informed Sven Anders about this, and am prepared to cover his loss in income for the mentoring.

I will try to explain my own understanding to date of the differing interpretations we (i.e. myself and The Seed Box Management Team) make of the mentorship.

I have understood the mentorship originally as the selection of two mentors, preferably with different backgrounds (perspectives and/or professions) who are selected by the researcher to comment on the researcher's work (at seminars, at meetings).

You did not accept my choice of mentor (Kyeyune), but were willing to accept another option that I had considered initially (Andreas Malm), to serve alongside Sven Anders Johansson. When I insisted on receiving motivations as to why the first option (Kyeyune) was rejected, these have focused on procedure (that we have already decided on one mentor), and resources (that it is too costly, or not possible to administer). What I do not understand is why there would be money for one choice of mentor and not another. Perhaps you could provide me with an answer here?

My impression then is that the Management Team decides on who can serve as mentor based on what it considers to be acceptable ideological positions, and have so far not provided reasoning or motivation for what makes one mentor more suitable than another. What is an acceptable ideological position is a matter that can be debated, ofcourse, and I hope we can do so.

I wish to communicate that I see the current preference of the Management Team as hindering potentially controversial perspectives from being part of our academic production process and it is not something I agree or go along with, and therefore decline from participating in the current mentorship program.

However, I invite you to debate these matters with me, within the framework of Seed Box, on what I think is the larger question here, namely: what is the purpose of our research? Do we think of our work primarily as interventions that contribute to justice in unequal power struggles? Or are we attempting to find truth? One can ofcourse wish to hold both these positions at the same time, but my argument would be that you have to steer towards one or the other.

The debate I suggest is one that addresses different positions on this question, but which I think also touches on the present matter of who is allowed to serve in a mentorship.

I write to let you know that I had a good first chat with Sven Anders but also that I have reconsidered the option of only going with him and insist on following the original plan of two mentors for the program (i.e. Sven Anders Johansson as academic and Malcom Kyeyune as non-academic).

Well, I have dropped the ball on this one, for sure. It has been a difficult time in my life and I apologise that this has had consequences for others.

Last we were in touch, you were asking for an official response from the SeedBox about why your original choice of mentor was not followed up. I had hoped that our conversation had cleared this up; if it is did not, please accept this email as that official response. This mentoring is a pilot program; having now done this for two (one successfully, one abandoned to be begun again) it is clear that it is not a simple thing to set up, particularly when suggested mentors are not academics. For this reason, and for this pilot outing, we are therefore asking Postdocs to provide a first choice of mentor as an academic, and someone preferably associated with the Seedbox in some capacity already. If there is no one suitable, then we can look beyond. Since you had also suggested an academic, this is the reason we are not going with your first choice. It will smooth the process.

Now, I know that you are leaving the Seedbox to take up a new role, and i have potentially missed the window during which time a mentor's feedback was going to be helpful to you.

ABSTRACT OF AME'S DRAFT WORK:

This chapter offers an ethnographic account of the contemporary ecocidal conditions experienced by people living on Nauru. It is one of five ethnographic chapters featured in the monograph "Between Sound and Silence: Listening for Environmental Justice", which composes sonic ethnographies to trace the complex ways that colonialism, extractive capitalism and environmental racism intersect with, and intensify, the impacts of climate change across the Pacific. More than aural hearing, I approach listening as a practice of sensing, attunement and noticing. Weaving together oral testimonies, conversations, stories, and environmental fieldrecordings, the book demonstrates how nuanced listening dispositions are critical to amplifying complex and diverse movements for self-determination and liberation beyond narrow definitions of victimhood and resilience.

AM Kanngieser is a geographer and sound artist. They are Senior Research Fellow for Seedbox Environmental Humanities Collaboratory, Department of Gender and Cultural Studies University of Sydney. They are the author of Experimental Politics and the Making of Worlds (2013) and Between Sound and Silence: Listening towards Environmental Justice (forthcoming), and have published in interdisciplinary journals including *South Atlantic*

Quarterly, Progress in Human Geography and *Environment and Planning D.* Their audio work has been featured on Documenta 14 Radio, BBC 3, ABC Radio National, The Natural History Museum London, Arts Centre Melbourne, Radio del Museo Reina Sofía, Deutschland Radio and QAGOMA. <u>https://amkanngieser.com/</u>

A/Prof Katerina Teaiwa (ANU) is of Banaban, I-Kiribati and African American heritage born and raised in Fiji. She is Associate Professor and Deputy Director - Higher Degree Research Training in the School of Culture, History and Language. She was founder and convener of the Pacific Studies teaching program at ANU 2007-2015, Head of Gender, Media and Cultural Studies, founder of the Pasifika Australia Outreach Program, and cofounder and co-chair of the ANU Family Friendly Committee. Her main area of research looks at the histories of British, Australian and New Zealand phosphate mining in the central Pacific. She focuses on the movement of Banaban rock and the complex power relations created by the mining, shipping, production and consumption of superphosphate and ensuing commodities. She also studies the ways in which Indigenous Banabans make sense of this difficult history of double displacement in their new home of Rabi Island in Fiji. Her work is captured in <u>Consuming Ocean Island: Stories of People and Phosphate</u> *from Banaba* Indiana University Press (2015).
